Welcome to the 2023 Fox River Chamber Fest!

The theme of this year's program, "Compelling Contrasts," celebrates variety during this 150th anniversary of Sergei Rachmaninoff's birth.

The music of Rachmaninoff, whose style looked backward to the 19th century, will be juxtaposed with his contemporaries who looked forward to new styles of the 20th century. Composer Rebecca Clarke makes a return appearance in the first week of the festival, along with a composer new to FRCF - Paul Hindemith. The second week includes music from Argentina, France, Germany, Mexico and Russia.

Predominantly a pianist and conductor, Rachmaninoff's compositional output is relatively small. All of his chamber works, with the exception of his works for piano and voice, were composed before he reached 30 years of age. However, his cello sonata and $2^{\rm nd}$ piano trio have found a permanent place in the chamber music canon.

The use or withholding of contrast is a primary tool in music of all styles. Rachmaninoff, in particular, is a master of building to musical climaxes through the use of repetition and sudden change over a long period of musical time. This contrast compels us to be carried away with the music and transported beyond our everyday existence.

Come along with us on this journey of perspectives and explore what compels you to continue attending the Fest year after year.

ALEX AYERS

A native of Wisconsin, Alex Ayers has played violin with the Milwaukee Symphony

Orchestra since 2013. He is currently the MSO's acting Assistant Concertmaster. Alex studied at Indiana University with Mimi Zweig and Alex Kerr. He has performed collaboratively with Joshua Bell, Alex Kerr, Jaime Laredo, Gilles Apap, and Soovin Kim at IU. Alex was a member of the Indiana University String Academy's

Violin Virtuosi ensemble for two years,

performing in the group's concert tours to France and Argentina. He has played at the Castleton Festival under Lorin Maazel and currently plays in the Peninsula Music Festival orchestra in the summer. Alex received an honorable mention in the 2015 ASTA National Solo Competition and was a semifinalist in the 2010 WAMSO Young Artist Competition and the 2009 Lennox Young Artist Competition. He was the grand prize winner of the Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra's Stars of Tomorrow Competition in 2006. When not playing the violin, Alex enjoys playing Scrabble, Bridge, and Hearts. He follows the tennis news closely and likes to watch the Bucks, Brewers, or Packers play.

KRISTIAN BRUSUBARDIS

Kristian is a violinist originally from Milwaukee, WI. Beginning in 2004, Kristian began playing in the Milwaukee Youth Symphony Orchestra until leaving to further his studies at the university level in 2011. He received his Bachelors in Violin Performance from Indiana University's Jacobs School of Music in 2017, studying with Sibbi Bernhardson. In 2020, Kristian earned a Graduate

Certificate from the Leonard Sorkin

International Institute of Chamber Music, under the instruction of

Bernard Zinck. Kristian has performed as a soloist with The Wisconsin Philharmonic Orchestra and has earned honors in many competitions with the Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra, Menomonee Falls Orchestra, Wisconsin Philharmonic, and Milwaukee Youth Symphony Orchestra. While living in Wisconsin, Kristian was the Sheboygan Symphony's assistant concertmaster and has performed with the Festival City Orchestra, Manitowoc Symphony Orchestra, Milwaukee Philharmonic, Kenosha Symphony Orchestra, Wisconsin Philharmonic, and the Kettle Moraine Orchestra. In 2021, Kristian was offered a position in the Civic Orchestra of Chicago as a regular member. Since the fall of 2021, Kristian has also been a substitute member of the Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra. Kristian also continues to teach privately and freelances regularly in the Milwaukee area.

JOSEPH HAUER

A native of Wisconsin, pianist Joseph Hauer is Artistic Director of the Fox River Chamber Fest. He was formerly an artist-in-residence at the Apollo Music Festival and the Bermuda Piano Festival. He has soloed with the Oberlin Orchestra, Wisconsin Chamber Orchestra, Madison Symphony Orchestra and Fox Valley Symphony Orchestra.

Prior to moving to Milwaukee, Joseph served on the Adjunct Faculty at NYU Steinhardt. He performs jazz piano at various venues in Milwaukee. When he is not engaged in music, he enjoys golf, biking and snowboarding.

LAURA KENNEY HENCKEL

Laura has Bachelor and Master of Music degrees in cello performance from the University of Michigan. She has been featured as soloist with the Manitowoc Symphony, the Green Bay Civic Symphony, and the Fox Valley Symphony. Laura is currently serving her 31st year as Principal Cellist of the Fox Valley Symphony.

Laura has held posts as Principal Cellist with the Green Bay Symphony, Manitowoc

Symphony, Oshkosh Water City Chamber Orchestra, Adrian Symphony Orchestra in Michigan, the Green Bay Civic Symphony, and numerous chamber ensembles. Laura was on the faculty of the Lawrence Community Music School (formerly the Lawrence Academy of Music) from 1991–2022.

Laura is also the Orchestra Director at St. Francis Xavier Middle and High Schools in Appleton, a position she has held since 2010.

Laura grew up in a very musical family and began her chamber music experience in a family piano trio with her mom, Carol Leybourn, and older brother, Paul Kenney. Laura is married to principal trumpeter of the Fox Valley Symphony, Michael Henckel, who have raised three talented musicians; Kayla (violin), Dylan (tenor) and Nolan (horn). Laura enjoys cooking with her husband, reading, tending to her garden, and spending time with her friends.

AIDAN HOGAN

Aidan Hogan is a cellist currently living in Wauwatosa, Wisconsin. Aidan frequently performs with regional orchestras in SE Wisconsin such as the Lake Geneva Symphony Orchestra, Kenosha Symphony, Wisconsin Philharmonic, Milwaukee Philharmonic and Kettle Moraine Symphony, as well as organizing private recitals. Aidan currently studies cello performance in Milwaukee under Milwaukee Symphony Cellist Lynn Kabat.

MICHAEL McCARTHY

Michael McCarthy, a native of Liberty
Boro, Pennsylvania, received his
Bachelor's degree from Case
Western Reserve University in
2012, and his Masters degree in
2014 from the Cleveland Institute
of Music as a student of William
Preucil. Michael then spent the
following three years as a violin
fellow with the New World Symphony
in Miami Beach, Florida. During his time

as a New World fellow, Michael performed in concerts at Carnegie Hall, the Kennedy Center, and the 2016 Festival Casals in San Juan, Puerto Rico. He collaborated in chamber music concerts with renowned artists such as Inon Barnatan and Roberto Gonzalez-Monjas, and also traveled to Medellín, Colombia to teach and perform as part of an exchange program with the Orquesta Filarmonica de Medellín. In November of 2015, Michael appeared as a guest soloist with the All University Orchestra of Carnegie Mellon performing Dvorak's *Violin Concerto*. Michael has been a substitute musician with the Canton Symphony Orchestra, Firelands Symphony Orchestra, and the Nashville Symphony, and has held positions with the Akron Symphony Orchestra, Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra, and Lincoln Center Stage.

MATTHEW MICHELIC

Matthew Michelic enjoys a vibrant career as an artist-teacher of the viola. He has performed throughout North America, Europe and in Asia, collaborating with artists such as Robert McDonald, Jeffery Solow, the Fine Arts Quartet, the Amelia Piano Trio and the Capela Quartet of Portugal. Mr. Michelic has appeared as guest recitalist for the New York Viola Society and has performed for Pope Benedict XVI at the Vatican. He has presented research at the annual conference of the American String Teachers Association, and his discussions of string pedagogy are published in the *Journal of the American Viola Society* and in *Strings* magazine.

Mr. Michelic has served on the faculty of numerous music festivals in the United States and Canada and has presented master classes at the Oberlin College Conservatory, the Peabody School of Music, the University of Macedonia in Greece and at the national conservatories of China and Vietnam. As faculty violist of the Lawrence University Conservatory of Music, he collaborates regularly within that community of extraordinary teaching artists. Mr. Michelic's former students now teach in public school, community school and university settings and perform in professional chamber and orchestral ensembles on several continents.

ANTHONY PADILLA

Anthony Padilla is a professor of piano and chamber music at the Lawrence
University Conservatory of Music in Appleton, Wisconsin. An American pianist of Filipino-Chinese ancestry, Padilla receives public and critical acclaim for performances of "enormous freshness, vitality, and poetry" (Chicago Tribune). Since his debut with the Seattle Symphony in

1983, he has become a popular guest artist throughout North America, Europe, and Asia. Highlights include solo and collaborative appearances at the Ravinia, Chautauqua, Schleswig-Holstein, Cascade, Bay View, San Luis Obispo, Vianden, and Saarburg Festivals. After his New York debut recital, the New York Concert Review called him "a strong-willed, steel-fingered tornado: he plays the piano with absolute authority and gives new meaning to the idea of 'interpretation' to the extent that the U.S. Patent Office might well grant him a number. Nobody could copy him." His teachers include legendary pianist Jorge Bolet at the Curtis Institute of Music and Nelita True at the Eastman School of Music, where he also served as teaching assistant for Jeffrey Kahane and Natalya Antonova. Awarded the prestigious Beethoven Fellowship by the American Pianists Association and top prize at the Concert Artists Guild International Competition, he is also a laureate of the Naumburg, Bachauer, Kapell, and Cleveland International Piano Competitions. He is a founding member of the Arcos Piano Trio, which was awarded an Artistic Excellence grant from the National Endowment for the Arts to commission and record chamber works by Latin American composers.

SHALLECE PETERS

Emerging soprano, Shallece Peters, is a first-place award winner and is active in opera, art song, concert work and musical theater. She was most recently seen as a soloist in Verdi's La forza del destino and Brahms' Requiem with Milwaukee's Bach Chamber Choir, in Handel's Messiah with Waukesha Choral Union and as Rosalinda in Die Fledermaus with

Master Singers of Milwaukee.

Previous roles include Donna Anna in *Don Giovanni*, Cathleen in *Riders to the Sea*, Madame Lidoine in *Dialogues of the Carmelites*, Queen of the Night in *Die Zauberflöte*, La bergère in *L'enfant et les sortileges*, and Dew Fairy in *Hansel and Gretel*.

Shallece received her Masters in Music in Voice and Opera from Northwestern University's Bienen School of Music and her Bachelor of Fine Arts from UW-Milwaukee's Peck School of the Arts. Shallece is currently on faculty at UW-Milwaukee as an Associate Lecturer of Voice, while owning, operating, and teaching at Shallece Saleen Studios - Fine Arts Academy in Muskego, WI.

JESTIN PIEPER

Jestin Pieper is a New York City based pianist, vocal coach, organist, conductor, and educator. As a performer, Mr. Pieper has appeared in major venues across the country and abroad including guest appearances on the Discovery Channel, WNYC, WNPR and Inward arts works podcast, and performances across the country including Carnegie Hall, symphony space, and The Bruno

Walter Auditorium. He has a solo piano album, *Humoreske*, which is available on

streaming services, and his music is available on his YouTube channel. Jestin is a current and founding member of the award winning ensemble, Luminae Trio, which has recently had received the NYFA, City Artist City Corps Grant and third prize in the Lancaster Chamber music competition in 2022 and were selected National finalists in the American Prize, and are the recipients of the Ensemble Forward grant from Chamber Music America in 2023.

Jestin received his Bachelor of Music, magna cum laude, from Lawrence University, a Master of Music degree from the University of Texas at Austin, and a professional studies certificate from Manhattan School of Music. He is currently the music director and principal organist at Holy Trinity Episcopal Church in Inwood and is on faculty as an Associate Adjunct Professor of Music at LIU Brooklyn RocNation School of Music, Sports and Entertainment.

CATHERINE VAN HANDEL

Catherine Van Handel joined the Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra as Principal Bassoon, holding the Muriel C. and John D.

Silbar Family Bassoon Chair, in 2017 at the age of 24. Van Handel has performed with numerous orchestras across the country including The Philadelphia Orchestra, Chicago Symphony Orchestra, National Symphony Orchestra, Kansas City Symphony, Virginia Symphony, and Richmond Symphony. Catherine has

worked under such world-renowned conductors as Sir Simon Rattle, Yannick Nézet-Séguin, Andris Nelsons, Fabio Luisi, Lorin Maazel, Edo de Waart, Stéphane Denève, and Osmo Vänskä, among many others.

As a soloist, Van Handel appears regularly with the Milwaukee Symphony and is recognized for her "elegant, buttery tone" (The Shepherd Express). She has given masterclasses in the United States and abroad and has served on bassoon faculty at the University of Toronto, Curtis Summerfest, and Pacific Music Institute in Honolulu, Hawaii.

Born in Taipei, Taiwan, Catherine Van Handel began her musical studies playing the piano at the age of four and the cello at the age of five. She started her bassoon education under the tutelage of Joyce Kelley, former Principal Bassoon of the New York City Opera, and went on to study with Marc Goldberg, former Associate Principal Bassoon of the New York Philharmonic, at the Pre-College Division of The Juilliard School. Catherine later received her Bachelor of Music from the Curtis Institute of Music, where she studied with Daniel Matsukawa, Principal Bassoon of the Philadelphia Orchestra.
